



Straw Weaving

OVERVIEW

Students will learn about weaving and then use a weaving technique to create a chain inspired by the work of Sara Bowen. Students will use yarn and drinking straws to complete the project. Students will be able of use their finished activity as a bookmark or other accessories.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Sara Bowen is a potter from South Alabama, creating functional pots inspired by her natural surroundings, favorite flora, and the feminine form. Her ceramic installation and gallery work focuses on creating other-worldly spaces, often featuring light, fiber, and poetry. Bowen's recent installation, "The Witch Doctor's Chapel," debuted along with her first book of poetry, "The Witch Doctor's Hymnal," both of which focus on healing and reconciling uncomfortable truths and childhood trauma.

CURRICULUM CONTENT

LEARN ABOUT THE WITCH DOCTOR'S CHAPEL

The Witch Doctor's Chapel was created by artist Sara Bowen to reconcile and honor complicated feelings about her late mother and the traumas of her Southern childhood. It's a space for healing, holding conflicting truths in one space, and ultimately celebrating resilience and broken parts. She began this installation with the goal of creating a magical space in the vein of the medieval chapels she studied as an art history student. As she mixed materials like silk and porcelain with light, the feeling persisted that she needed something more to create the magic she was seeking. Meanwhile, Bowen was writing poems to process her childhood, grief, and difficult relationship with her mother, and along the way the poems and installation merged.







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ART INSTRUCTION

MATERIALS

3 drinking straws, small balls of yar, scissors, tape, pipecleaner

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. The instructor should discuss the basics and history of weaving
- 2. grab 3 staws and begin threading yarn through each straw using a pipecleaner. Leave a long tail of yarn on one side.
- 3. To hold yarn in place, tape yarn to the end of straws individually and knot the tail ends together on the opposite end.
- 4. To start weaving, take another ball of yarn and tie it onto the end of the straw cloe to the knotted ends
- 5. Begin to weave under and over until you reach the last straw. Then weave back towards the first straw. Repeating this motion(over and under) until the students have reached the end of the straw.
- 6. to remove weaving from straws, gently pull straws from open ended side.
- 7. Lastly, knot the yarn ends under the woven yarn. Students can use their finished project as a headband, bracelet, bookmark, keychain, or necklace.





TERMS

WEAVING - joining at two threads to form a cloth

WARP - The set of vertical threads.

WEFT- the set of horizontal threads

LOOM - is a frame usually made of wood that gives support and tension while working the loom
