

Fork Abstracts

OVERVIEW

Students will learn about abstract art. They will create their own abstract pieces using forks and pastels. This project will allow students to experiment with different art materials.

STANDARDS

Can you use different objects as brushes?

STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students Will:

- Explore and experiment with a range of art materials
- Create an artwork using found and/or recycled objects.
- Compare responses to a work of art before and after working in similar media

Fork Abstracts

ART INSTRUCTION

MATERIALS

8.5" x 11" cardstock paper, watercolors, brushes, cup of water, crayons, sharpie

INSTRUCTIONS

Students should learn about abstract art and discuss the difference in realism vs. abstracts for better understand.

On a piece of paper, allow students to begin drawing shapes onto the paper using oil pastels. Make sure that the shapes are in rows. Students can use multiple colors

After studens are finished drawing shapes, in struct them to grab fors and dip them in paint

The students can drag the fork onto the paper creating lines, circles, dots, or other different patterns.

Allow paintings to dry







TERMS

ABSTRACT ART - art that does not attempt to represent an accurate depiction of a visual reality but instead use shapes, colours, forms and gestural marks to achieve its effect

Realism - a mid nineteenth century artistic movement characterised by subjects painted from everyday life in a naturalistic manner; however the term is also generally used to describe artworks painted in a realistic almost photographic way.
